Canada trade deficit (Jul) widens out to -CAD2.7B.

The Canadian trade deficit widened out in July to -C\$2.7B from a downwardly revised deficit of -C\$1.8B (originally reported -C\$1.1B) in June. Not a great way to start a new quarter. Recall that in Q2/10, net trade punched 4.4ppt out of GDP. Going into Q3 it was hoped that the trade picture even if only on the margins, would begin to improve.

Geographically, Canada's surplus with the US narrowed by C\$1.2 bn accounting for the bulk of the deterioration in the trade picture. By contrast, trade with the EU and Japan improved, driving the 3.7% gain in exports to other countries. That said, the US continues to represent 74% of the market for Canadian exports.

Underneath the headlines, the mix of factors behind the wider deficit was less than ideal, driven by a -0.7% m/m decline in exports at the same time that imports were run up by 2.0% m/m. In terms of volumes, exports dropped by 0.6% m/m while import volumes jumped by 1.4% m/m.

Ironically, a big part of the deterioration in the trade picture came on the back of a -0.8% decline in energy exports (nat. gas up, crude and coal down), aggravated by an 11.9% rise in energy imports. This alone accounts for roughly C\$400mn of the swing in the trade deficit. So much for a petrol currency.

It is often forgotten that Canada is a big importer of energy - light crudes are imported in order to be blended with the heavy crude that comes out of the oil sands, enabling it to be pushed through a pipeline. So too do east coast refineries tend to be big importers of non-heavy grades to be turned into high grade gasolines.

Sticking with the commodities theme, exports in the metals category were hard hit as well. Copper ore exports down nearly 40%, nickel -26%, zinc -22%. Although these declines are largely a reflection of significant gains in previous months. In a nutshell, CAD was not much of a commodity play in July.

The trade in automotive products was another big part of the story. While auto sector exports were flat, imports were up 2.9% m/m led by passenger vehicles. Recall that while many Canadian auto manufacturing plants implemented the two week summer shut down in July, this was not the case in the US where plants continued to operate. The case could be made that in August, Canadian auto exports play a little catchup. Aerospace also hard hit. On the upside, a massive 52% jump in truck exports was noted.

Net, net, the trade number portends a still significant drag on GDP coming out of the trade sector. An area of the economy that needs to perform if Canada is to see the makings of a sustainable economic recovery as consumer demand moderates and government stimulus comes to an end at the end of Q1/11. On that basis there is a very necessary hand off of demand from the consumer and gov't spending on over to business (this element is working) and external demand (continuing to drag).
